30 years ago (May, 1990) ~ Plans are underway this year to have one community Memorial Day Service in Parkston. Watch for further details. To insure perpetual care for the future upkeep of our cemeteries, whether church or community, special gifts are welcome to keep building up the interest-bearing funds so that the upkeep can be paid from the interest received each year.

25 years ago (May, 1995) ~ Memorial Day has been made into a big holiday weekend instead of a day of respect and tribute to the departed. Out of 365 days in any given year, can't we stop long enough to bow our heads and pay respect to our departed loved ones ... and especially those who fell in battle on distant shores while helping preserve the liberties of America? Let us take time to make the pilgrimage to our various cemeteries and stop long enough to say "Thank you, Father, for the life that has been lived and for friendships that we have shared".

20 years ago (May, 2000) ~ We can celebrate the anniversary of Jesus' resurrection, but the truth of the resurrection always comes as a surprise ~ God's surprise to people and creation consumed with sin and death, God's surprise, not our idea, or plan, or accomplishment. 15 years ago (May, 2005) ~ The Senior Meals Program, a non-profit organization that recognizes the needs of the aging population 60 and over to maintain independence, while living at home is coming to Parkston. Well-nourished people have longer, healthier lives, fewer health complications, lower health care costs, faster healing and shorter hospital stays. The goal of Senior Meals is to provide high quality meals to as many aging friends as resources will allow. These services are provided in a compassionate, caring way and in a cost-effective manner. Senior meals are served in a group setting in Parkston at *Papa B's*, Monday through Friday, starting Monday, May 2, 2005, at 12:00 pm. Cost of each meal is \$2.50. Funding for meals is a joint effort between federal and state governments, community support, and participant donations. Participants are encouraged to donate what they can afford. No one is denied meals for inability to pay. Senior Meals can also be delivered to individuals who are homebound.

10 years ago (May, 2010) ~ Our faith can grow ~ The suspension bridge over Niagara Falls was begun by a thread attached to a kite. When the wind blew, the kite floated across the water to the other side. Workers then attached a string to the thread and pulled it across. To the string, they attached a rope and pulled it back. By this slow-but-sure method, the bridge was built. Our faith may be just a little thread or no larger than a mustard seed, but we must act on it (see James 2:14-18). Through action, our faith will be strengthened (Colossians 1:23) as it moves us to do even greater works of faith for our Lord (2 Thessalonians 1:3). And in this slow-but-sure way, our faith can grow exceedingly (Ephesians 4:15-16).

# Find us on: facebook®

One of the biggest changes for Salem Lutheran Church in this COVID-19 time is that we are having church on Facebook. We show it live at 9:00 am on Sunday and then it stays on Salem Lutheran Parkston's Facebook feed after that so you can watch it anytime. In the past six week we are not alone in trying to find ways to get church to people's homes. Many churches have started recording worship and then have it available on Facebook or YouTube. For years churches have broadcast their worship on TV or radio on Sunday mornings.

At this time, with so many churches doing remote church, the idea of how to record the attendance number to reflect those not sitting in the pews has come to the forefront of people's minds. We have been given a way to calculate that number and it will be noted in addition to our weekly attendance. Personally I think tracking the number of church goers is fixating more on how good we look compared to others or in the past rather than what good we are doing as Christians. However, after looking at the number of people we are reaching with having worship on Facebook, I believe we as a church should seriously think more about how we are spreading God's word and how we can make sure even more people can hear it.

I have long thought the ELCA should have more outlets for talking about our faith. The Catholic Church has a whole TV network and radio station that broadcasts 24-7. Maybe this situation we have found ourselves in is our opportunity to speak to a larger audience than ever before.

We, here at Salem Lutheran Church, are indeed reaching more people than ever before. To track our on line viewing we will be looking at how many "views" we have. A view is when someone clicks to watch the video of a church service either live or recorded. We are to look at the number of views one week after the video was put on Facebook. So far in six weeks of being on Facebook our average number of views, as we have been told to calculate them, is 220 views.

Not only do our members get to see the worship, but so do our family and friends, former members who live out of the area and community people. More than ever so many people have the opportunity to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ. I don't know what things will look like when we get back to "normal", but I sincerely hope things get back to "better than normal" and that our church will seriously consider keeping all the new ways we have learned to be church together even when we have been apart.

Grace and peace to you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit!

We are writing to you to share the news that the South Dakota Synod Council at its regularly scheduled meeting on Friday, March 20, 2020, voted to cancel this year's synod assembly. The assembly was scheduled to convene June 5-6, 2020, at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls, SD. This was a difficult decision, and one that was made after much discussion. Considerations included the predicted longevity of the COVID-19 pandemic, recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), input from Presiding Bishop Eaton and the ELCA Office of the Secretary, the SD Synod Constitution and Bylaws, and South Dakota state law.

The Rev. Jonathan Vehar, secretary of the South Dakota Synod, has prepared a document "Effects of Canceling the Synod Assembly of the SD Synod." This document outlines what this cancelation means for our continued journey as the SD Synod. Please find the resource sheet in this mailing as well as on the synod's website **sdsynod.org/assembly**.

Please know that the Synod Council has not taken this step without prayerful discernment. This was a hard and disheartening step as we looked forward to this annual gathering as God's people in South Dakota. We especially were looking forward to celebrating the 50-40-10 anniversary, the installation of the Bishop's associates, the Rev. Jonathan Steiner and the Rev. Renee Splichal Larson, and sharing our five-year vision plan of *Journeying Together in Christ*.

Although canceling the June assembly was painful, the decision opened new possibilities. We are delighted to share with you that we are planning a celebration of the 50-40-10 anniversary and the five-year vision of Journeying Together in Christ later this year when guidelines will once again permit gathering in large groups. In preparation for this anniversary, the installation and vision sharing, we invite your ministry site to tithe your synod assembly registration fee to the SD Synod. This thank offering for the partnership between the synod office and the congregations of the SD Synod will provide seed money for a meaningful Fall synod-wide celebration.

Please know that both of us would be happy to visit with you about any questions or concerns you may have regarding the cancelation and the fall plans. In closing, we leave you with Paul's words from his letter to his siblings in Rome:

Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: 'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:35-39)

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# Effects of Canceling the Synod Assembly of the South Dakota Synod

In response to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Synod Council of the South Dakota Synod decided to cancel the Synod Assembly scheduled for June of 2020. This document seeks to address the consequences of that decision for our joint ministry. Sections of the *Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions* that outline the roles and responsibilities of the Synod Assembly are presented below. Only matters that would be affected by the canceling of the 2020 assembly have been placed for consideration. For example, no officer of this synod is up for election; therefore, it is not of concern at this moment to address those duties of the assembly. I don't presume to have all the correct answers here or that I have considered every possible implication.

# **Resolutions and Memorials:**

The Synod Assembly has the sole authority to act on Resolutions from Conference Assemblies and to adopt Memorials to be submitted to the Churchwide Assembly. Many of the Conference Assemblies were not able to meet, so were not able to submit resolutions. If a matter were to come forward, depending on the nature and scope of a response, it might be in order for the Synod Council to address. Any matter requesting action from the Churchwide Assembly must be adopted by the Synod Assembly as a Memorial. However, since the next Churchwide Assembly will not meet until 2022, there is no urgency.

#### Elections

A prime function of the Synod Assembly is the election of the Synod Council, committees, boards, and partner ministries.

Synod Council: Members of the Synod Council are nominated from conferences and elected by the Synod Assembly to a four-year term. In general, when persons are elected, they serve their term or until a successor is elected. This will give us a grace period to allow current members to continue to serve until their successor is elected. There are several complicating factors. First, assuming that current members are willing to serve an extra year, at the 2021 Synod Assembly, 1/2 of the Synod Council would be up for election. This causes problems in staggering term-limits into the future and to ensure that there is not too much turnover in one year. Another option is to have the Synod Council fill vacancies. If a Synod Council member whose turn is expiring were to resign, the Synod Council could vote to fill the position. S10.03.f. states that vacancies are filled until the next regular meeting of the Synod Assembly. However, to fill a vacancy, the position still needs to be nominated by the appropriate conference. Some conferences have already met, and this would fulfill the letter of the provisions. We still have the same problem with ½ of the council being elected at one assembly.

*Board for LSS:* S9.01.11. stipulates that the Synod Assembly elects members to the Board of Directors for LSS. This was a new provision in 2019, and the assembly elected members to staggered terms. Because this provision serves the needs of LSS, we should check with Betty Oldenkamp about what they need moving forward.

Other Committees: the Mutual Ministry, EOC, and MCC, vacancies are filled by the conferences. Although reading the Constitution more in-depth with election questions in mind, I wonder if our practice in electing these committees matches what the Constitution says. Thoughts for later.

Consultation Committees and Discipline Committee: are filled by the Synod Council until the next Synod Assembly. We can argue the same points as the Synod Council.

Synod Related Ministries not specified in the governing documents:

The Synod Assembly has, in the past, also elected the Board of Directors for the Chapel on the Hill and the Augustana Association. If they need offices filled, I assume the same authority granted the Synod Council would work, but we should check with them as well.

# **Budget and allotment to Churchwide:**

**S15.13.** Based on estimated income, the Synod Council shall authorize expenditures within the Budget for the fiscal year. Expenditure authorizations shall be subject to revision, in light of changing conditions, by the Synod Council. We would need to tread carefully if the Synod Council wanted to act in ways counter to the will of the Synod Assembly. For example, approving a 3rd Associate to the Bishop or changing the funding model used for supported ministries. The Synod Council cannot change the percent allocation that is directed to the churchwide organization.

# **Amending the Constitution:**

We will have to wait until the next regular Synod Assembly to adopt changes.



# "God is not a workaholic" ...

In Sabbath as Resistance, Walter Brueggemann likens our consumerism-driven society to ancient Egypt. Hebrew slaves made bricks for storehouses for the wealth of the upper class, at the top of which sat Pharaoh. Now, as then, the push is always to do more, earn more, make more; we worry there's not enough time or money. "In this system there can be no Sabbath rest," says the author.

Yet, at the culmination of creation, "God rested on the seventh day. God did not show up to do more. . . . God did not come and check on creation in anxiety to be sure it was all working." and "because the creator is anxiety-free," we can be too. "God is not a workaholic," writes Brueggemann. "God does not keep jacking up production schedules. To the contrary, God rests, confident, serene, at peace." God's rest, in turn, gives us ~ who are created in his image ~ a "restfulness that contradicts the 'drivenness'" of Pharaoh's Egypt and modern society.

# Adopted by God . . .

Anecdotes abound of couples who become pregnant soon after finalizing a long-awaited adoption. A Reader's Digest contributor recounts how one such mother later handled well-meaning inquiries about which child was "hers" (biologically). She replied: "I've forgotten."

That mindset, perhaps, is why John Piper calls adoption "a picture of the Gospel". God, through his Son Jesus, makes us his very own eternally beloved children.

Max Lucado writes: "If anybody understands God's ardor for his children, it's someone who has rescued an orphan from despair, for that is what God has done for us. God has adopted you. God sought you, found you, signed the papers and took you home."

We've excitedly and eagerly awaited another summer filled with homecomings back to the camps that we cherish and love—those beautiful places where we experience Christ's love in community and creation on the back of a horse, in a kayak on the lake, on a mountain peak in the Black Hills, or around an evening campfire.

# But for as much as we love and care for our camps, we love and care for our campers and guests even more.

We are living in a time when we have been given the important responsibility to refrain from gathering in community to make our best effort, the only effort we know to be true, to prevent the spread of Covid-19.

We have been directed by federal, state, and local governing agencies to put on hold, for some time, gatherings of people in close communities so that we might care for the well-being of all of our neighbors.

We've watched as schools have moved to on-line learning for the remainder of the school year, congregations have gathered for worship over social media, and community social events, tournaments, gatherings, concerts, celebrations, and more have had to cancel or postpone until further notice.

Through it all, we've had hope that summer camp might be exempt from this. But the risks are just too great.

At the heart of our ministry, the well-being and safety of our campers and guests is our highest priority.

Therefore, based on the information we have available to us today, the leadership staff and Board of Directors have made the following important decisions:

- Cancellation of all summer programs at all Lutherans Outdoors sites for the 2020 summer season.
- Postponement of all hosted ministries/retreats for an indefinite period of time.

- Postponement of all programmed events for an indefinite period of time (including fundraising events, special event gatherings, and programmed retreats).
- Cancellation of summer worship services at all Lutherans Outdoors sites for the 2020 summer season.

Never before, in the history of this organization, has there been a decision so difficult to make. The financial ramifications will be great and may yield more difficult decisions.

But we, as an organization, are called to serve people. This decision is what is best for the people whom we are called to serve during this time.

The leadership staff and Board of Directors have been diligently planning our response to this decision including the coordination of rescheduling groups at our sites, navigating operational decisions, and facilitating important temporary changes as they pertain to seasonal/summer staff as well as year-round staff and volunteers.

Over the course of the next few months, all summer camp participants, retreat guests, special events attendees/ticket holders, and volunteers will be contacted by members of the Lutherans Outdoors staff with options regarding deposits, rescheduling, and further information regarding LO's operations.

We also will continue to pay attention to how our federal, state, and local governments will direct us over the next few weeks and months. We are prepared to offer alternative intergenerational programs and opportunities at our sites for late summer and early fall in the event that we are given clearance to operate and provide safe gatherings spaces for communities of people.

God calls us to love our neighbors in extraordinary ways—and for the time being—we strive to create innovative ways to explore Christ's love within social-distanced communities and inspire our constituency to experience creation wherever we may be.

We know, without a doubt, that on the other side of this Covid-19 pandemic, Lutherans Outdoors in South Dakota will be a stronger outdoor ministry organization. This situation will challenge us to pause, evaluate, and innovate our beloved ministry programs that happen at each of our four unique and wonderful ministry sites.

We are thankful for your continued partnership and support of Lutherans Outdoors in South Dakota. As we continue to pray for each and every one of you, we ask for your prayers in return and your continued support and generosity towards this ministry that we cherish and love deeply.

# The birth of the Church ...

Fifty days after the Resurrection, the first Christians, most of them Jews, gathered to celebrate the Jewish harvest festival known as Pentecost.

At that gathering something happened that was so awesome and indescribable that when writing about it, St. Luke could only use metaphors. A sound like the rush of a violent wind seemed to fill the entire house where they were meeting. Something like tongues of fire appeared among them ~ a tongue rested on each of them.

As we commemorate Memorial Day this year, here is a bit of history ... Lest we forget Here is a great take on the corona virus from an elderly gentleman who's been through a lot.

I talked with a man today, an 80+ year old man. I asked him if there was anything I can get him while this Coronavirus scare was gripping America.

He simply smiled, looked away and said:

"Let me tell you what I need! I need to believe, at some point, this country my generation fought for . . . I need to believe this nation we handed safely to our children and their children . . . I need to know this generation will quit being a bunch of sissies . . . that they respect what they've been given . . . that they've earned what others sacrificed for."

I wasn't sure where the conversation was going or if it was going anywhere at all. So, I sat there, quietly observing.

"You know, I was a little boy during WWII. Those were scary days. We didn't know if we were going to be speaking English, German or Japanese at the end of the war. There was no certainty, no guarantees like Americans enjoy today.

And no home went without sacrifice or loss. Every house, up and down every street, had someone in harm's way. Maybe their Daddy was a soldier, maybe their son was a sailor, maybe it was an uncle. Sometimes it was the whole entire family . . . fathers, sons, uncles...

Having someone, you love, sent off to war . . . it wasn't less frightening than it is today. It was scary as Hell. If anything, it was more frightening. We didn't have battle front news. We didn't have email or cellphones. You sent them away and you hoped . . . you prayed. You may not hear from them for months, if ever. Sometimes a mother was getting her son's letters the same day Dad was comforting her over their child's death.

And we sacrificed. You couldn't buy things. Everything was rationed. You were only allowed so much milk per month, only so much bread, toilet paper. EVERYTHING was restricted for the war effort. And what you weren't using, what you didn't need, things you threw away, they were saved and sorted for the war effort. My generation was the original recycling movement in America.

And we had viruses back then . . . serious viruses. Things like polio, measles, and such. It was nothing to walk to school and pass a house or two that was quarantined. We didn't shut down our schools. We didn't shut down our cities. We carried on, without masks, without hand sanitizer. And do you know what? We persevered. We overcame. We didn't attack our President, we came together. We rallied around the flag for the war. Thick or thin, we were in it to win. And we would lose more boys in an hour of combat than we lose in entire wars today."

He slowly looked away again. Maybe I saw a small tear in the corner of his eye. Then he continued: "Today's kids don't know sacrifice. They think a sacrifice is not having coverage on their phone while they freely drive across the country. Today's kids are selfish and spoiled. In my generation, we looked out for our elders. We helped out with single moms who's husbands were either at war or dead from war. Today's kids rush the store, buying everything they can . . . no concern for anyone but themselves. It's shameful the way Americans behave these days. None of them deserve the sacrifices their granddads made.

So, no I don't need anything. I appreciate your offer but, I know I've been through worse things than this virus. But maybe I should be asking you, what can I do to help you? Do you have enough pop to get through this, enough steak? Will you be able to survive with 113 channels on your TV?"

I smiled, fighting back a tear of my own . . . now humbled by a man in his 80's. All I could do was thank him for the history lesson, leave my number for emergency and leave with my ego firmly tucked in my rear.

I talked to a man today. A real man. An American man from an era long gone and forgotten. We will never understand the sacrifices. We will never fully earn their sacrifices. But we should work harder to learn about them . . . learn from them . . . to respect them.

# **BITS & PIECES**



**THE MAY NOISY OFFERING** on Sunday, May17, will benefit St. Dysmas Prison Ministries in South Dakota. St. Dysmas of South Dakota expanded to Mike Durfee State Prison in Springfield, SD, when men, who had attended worship at SDSP in Sioux Falls, were transferred and requested continued ministry. To meet the need, Pastor Robert Hansen began Bible study in the summer of 1992 and worship was started on November 19.

South Dakota State Penitentiary is located in northern Sioux Falls, occupying approximately thirty acres. First constructed as a territorial prison in 1881, it became the South Dakota State Penitentiary when South Dakota was granted statehood in 1889. Though a large portion of the original buildings remain, numerous structural changes have occurred over the years.

Mike Durfee State Prison is located on the campus of the former University of South Dakota at Spring-field. The 1984 legislature closed the college and authorized the establishment of a correctional facility. Spring-field State Prison opened in December 1984 and from 1985 to 1997 was a coed facility. Since completion of a Women's Prison facility in Pierre, MDSP houses only male inmates. On September 10, 1999, the prison was renamed in honor of Mike Durfee, a former instructor at USD/Springfield who later served as deputy Director of the South Dakota Department of Corrections. A building project at MDSP in 2005, resulted in additional men being transferred there making it the largest prison facility in the state.

Notifying the church office that the name needs to be on the prayer list again will be the responsibility of the person who had put the name on the list, or of anyone else (including the person being prayed for) who feels the name should be there. If the person is to be removed from the list before the end of the four (4) week period, we must hear from the person who had requested the name be put on, or that person him/herself.

VISITING WITH HER PASSENGER, Uber driver Latonya Young mentioned her determination to finish college ~ and a \$700 debt that barred her from enrolling in more classes. "Every time I got ready to pay the money, my kids needed something," she said later. "I said, 'Okay, I'll just wait."

To Young's great surprise, a few days after that Uber conversation, she learned that her customer, Kevin Esch, had paid her debt; she could reenroll! In response, Young persevered to finish her degree with strong grades. "When he paid the balance, I had to do this for him," she said of Esch, who attended her graduation.

Young's self-sacrifice for her children and Esch's self-sacrifice for a stranger both pale, of course, in comparison to Jesus' sacrifice of his very life to save us. Like Young held back by debt, we were captive to sin until "the Son of Man came . . . to give his life as a ransom: (Matthew 20:28, ESV). Young did nothing to earn Esch's gift, and we can do nothing to earn salvation. But as she responded by using the gift to its fullest, we embrace God's gift by living in thanksgiving and praise, love and service.



Make this cute puppet to show and tell the amazing story of metamorphosis.  $\cap$ 




# What you need:

- Needle and string
- 12 small pom-poms
- Wooden craft stick
- Scissors
- Googly eyes
- Glue
- Coffee filter
- Markers

# What you do:

- 1. Sew pom-poms together to make a caterpillar body. Tie off that string.
- 2. Thread another string up through the first pompom, leaving 12 inches to dangle. Repeat with the ninth pom-pom, leaving two dangling strings.
- 3. Wrap those strings around opposite ends of the stick, adjusting their length to about 6 inches. Tie in place.
- 4. Glue on eyes.
- 5. Flatten the coffee filter and draw a symmetrical design on it. Pleat in the center to create wings.
- 6. Move the caterpillar puppet by holding the stick. Glue on the wings as you describe the transformation into a butterfly.
